b. FARM BUREAU:

g. PROTECTING FAMILY FARMS & FORESTS WORKSHOP 1/24/18 (The Last Green Valley)

Informational workshops on land conservation, including, easements, grants, and the Forest Legacy Program. Sponsored by the Ashford & Willington Conservation Commission, The Last Green Valley, MassConn, and the Connecticut Farmland Trust.

h. SOLAR PANELS (PRIDES CORNER)

A self-sustaining energy supply on the roof over the heads of workers and products in their shipping area were two of the major improvements brought to Pride's Corner Farms, a wholesale plant grower in Lebanon, CT. The 735 solar panels installed on the roofs of open-sided greenhouses built over the shipping area are expected to produce 25-percent of the energy used on the 400-acre farm. The company received about \$600,000 from a USDA Rural Energy for America Program (REAP) grant that encourages renewable energy and energy efficiency investments at farms. Prides Corner Farms' array is an example of a solar installation that takes advantage of a farm's agricultural infrastructure, generating electricity that helps offset costs of production and makes the farm more viable. The solar panels covering the approximately 2-acre concrete shipping pad should produce about 296,600 kilowatts annually, or the equivalent of the electricity it takes to power 27 homes for a year.
